

Debra Harry is Kooyooee Dukaddo from Pyramid Lake, Nevada. She serves as the Executive Director of the Indigenous Peoples Council on Biocolonialism (IPCB) and the Producer of the 2003 documentary film *The Leech and the Earthworm*, an IPCB/Yeast Directions production that examines the globalized hunt for genes within Indigenous peoples territories and features Indigenous leaders from around the world. In 1994, Harry received a three-year Kellogg Foundation leadership fellowship and studied the field of human genetic research and its implications for Indigenous peoples. She was a recent fellow in the "Leading From the Inside Out" Rockwood Leadership Fellowship Program. In 1997, she earned a master's degree in community economic development from New Hampshire College, and has completed all requirements as a doctoral candidate at the University of Auckland, School of Education, with an expected completion date of April 2008. The title of her dissertation is, "Indigenous Wisdom in the Biotech Age: The Development of New Knowledge in the Context of Biocolonialism." Ms. Harry is the founder and director of the Emerging Indigenous Leadership Institute, a new and innovative Indigenous-centered educational program designed to nurture the next generation of Indigenous leadership.
