



Sarah L. Hicks (Alutiiq) is an enrolled member of the Native Village of Ouzinkie and the director of the Policy Research Center at the National Congress of American Indians (NCAI), the oldest, largest, and most representative national Indian organization representing the broad interests of tribal governments in the United States. Her work with American Indian and Alaska Native governments and intertribal organizations addresses the need for information and data to support proactive tribal policy development at the national and local level. Previously, Sarah served as the director of NCAI's welfare reform service delivery reform in Indian Country. In 2002, she testified before the Senate on proposed human service delivery reform in Indian Country. She has been the recipient of many awards, including the Lynn Reyer Award in Tribal Community Development, the Emerging Scholar Award from the Association for Research on Nonprofit Organizations and Voluntary Association, and the Kathryn M. Buder Scholarship for American Indian Students. She holds a BA in sociology from Goucher College and a master's in social work from Washington University in St. Louis, where she is also a PhD candidate. Her dissertation is entitled *Determinants and Variation of Large Foundations' Grantmaking to Native America*.
